- **State India's present demographic turn:** fertility, momentum, ageing, migration, sex ratio
- **Project challenges over about fifty years:** work, care, cities, environment, politics of numbers
- **Keep anthropology:** household, region, caste-class, women
- Avoid panic and avoid slogan population policy

Revision summary

India nears replacement fertility with momentum still adding people, then ageing.

The next fifty years bring jobs for youth, care for the old, north-south political imbalance, urban migration and gender gaps.

Tribal and poor child undernutrition remains a biocultural failure inside the same story.

Emergency coercion and Malthusian panic are the wrong tools.

Household education, women's work and social security are the anthropological policy line.

Introduction

India is leaving a long era of rapid population growth and entering a **divided half-century**: more workers in some states, more elderly in others, more cities, and a still-skewed child sex ratio in parts of the north-west. The challenges of the next fifty years are about **age structure, care, migration and inequality**, not only about a national headcount.

Body

Where the dynamics stand

Census 2011 and **NFHS-5** show a **total fertility rate** near or below replacement in many southern and western states, with higher fertility still in parts of the Hindi belt, though falling. **Population momentum** from a young age pyramid will add people for decades even at replacement fertility. **Life expectancy** has risen; **infant mortality** has fallen. The **child sex ratio** remains adverse where son preference and sex selection persist. **Urbanisation** and **internal migration** (Bihar-UP to Delhi and Mumbai, east to Kerala, tribal belts to brick kilns) already reshape households.

- **UN and national projections toward 2070 commonly show India ageing:** a larger share above sixty, a shrinking child share, and a **south that ages first**. Absolute numbers may peak then decline slowly. These are **projections**, not fate; they depend on education, contraception

and mortality shocks (COVID-19 showed that).

Challenges of the next fifty years

Employment and the youth bulge. Northern states will still send young workers. If jobs are informal and urban housing is slum-based, the "dividend" is a political risk. Caste and ST/SC school gaps decide who captures formal work.

Ageing and care. Kerala, Tamil Nadu and later Bengal will need pensions, geriatrics and kin care when daughters-in-law are themselves workers. Anthropology of the **joint family** (**Irawati Karve, A. M. Shah**) matters: the family cannot automatically absorb elder care. Transnational care chains (nurses abroad) already exist.

Regional imbalance. Delimitation after the freeze on Lok Sabha seats will pit high-fertility north against low-fertility south. This is a **federal demographic conflict**, not a technical footnote.

Gender. Missing women, widowhood, and unpaid care will shape the half-century. A two-child political norm, where revived, collides with reproductive rights and with minority and tribal fears of counting.

Health and environment. Stunting among tribal and poor children, non-communicable disease in ageing cities, heat and water stress, and megacity air are biocultural problems. **COVID-19** showed that migrant workers and slum density are demographic facts.

Migration and identity. Assam, Bengaluru and Delhi politics already treat migrants as ethnic others. **Ethno-nationalism** (a later question on this paper) will use numbers. Tribal areas may empty of youth while census ST shares shift through listing politics.

Data. Without a delayed **Census** completed and without civil registration that covers hamlets, policy will fly blind. Digital population registers raise the ethics named in 4(a): counting must not become exclusion.

Anthropological stance

Malthusian panic and **Emergency** sterilisation are the two failed grammars. Household strategy - son, school fee, land fragment, bride-price or dowry - is the unit. **Srinivas**'s mobility and **Vidyarthi**'s tribal transformation both predict that fertility falls when the forest or the field no longer rewards extra hands and when women stay in school. Policy that is health, education, childcare and old-age security matches that ethnography. Policy that only preaches small families does not.

Conclusion

The next fifty years will test whether India can employ a still-large youth cohort, care for a growing old cohort, and share political power across regions with different fertility histories. The demographic challenge is social organisation, not a single national birth rate.

Facts & figures

National Family Health Survey-5 (NFHS-5)

Showed many states at or below replacement TFR, with remaining higher fertility in parts of north and central India.

Population momentum

A young age structure keeps births high after fertility falls, because large cohorts still enter reproductive age.

Delimitation freeze

Lok Sabha seat shares have been frozen on older census figures; a future thaw will expose north-south population politics.

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
